
Stag Brewery Development






Internet Safety

We do lots of work with the children about staying safe online — but do you also do this at home? Do you have clear rules and monitoring of children's online usage? Please do talk to your children regularly and openly about the sites they're using and monitor their internet history and media use.

We often hear children talking about unsupervised internet use and being signed up to social media sites. Indeed, I'm sure you recognise the logos below, but do you know the legal age limits?




- To be a YouTube account holder you need to be 18 years old, or 13 with parent's permission.
- Twitter's minimum age is 13 years old
- WhatsApp's minimum age is 16 years old.
- Instagram's minimum age is 13 (this is the site we hear of children using most often)
- Facebook is 13 years old
- Musical.ly is 13 years old

Please ensure your primary age child is not accessing these sites without your knowledge. I know of different children at Lowther that are account holders for all these sites. We need to do more to support and protect children online. This is such an important part of growing up for children now and needs very close monitoring and supervision by teachers and parents.

Please don't underestimate the size of this issue and how important it it that we are all proactive about protecting our children. Some stark statistics that you might not be aware of are included here.
