So far this school year we have achieved an excellent attendance rate of 97.1% with three classes exceeding 98% - well done Beech, Y6 and 3C! ## Free School meal entitlement

Please do enquire at the office about whether you are entitled to free school meals. It's a double win as your child gets a delicious hot, healthy lunch for free (+ no need to make sandwiches!) AND the school gets given an extra sum of money for each pupil that is eligible for a free meal. I have a school meal every day and think they're excellent! This includes if your child is in Reception or Key Stage 1 as the school receives this additional funding for each pupil entitled to a free school but ONLY if parents register for it. Please do check with the office if you're not sure if you may be entitled. It really does help the school financially (and of course you too) Result!

Parents evening is just around the corner. We expect children from Y3-6 to come to the meeting with their parents. It is really powerful for children to hear first hand with their parents how well they're doing and what their next steps are. 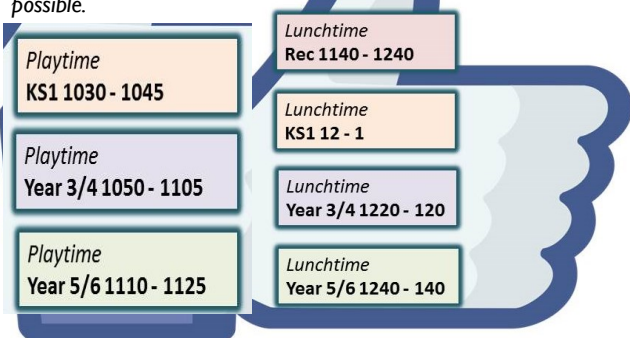

Our new lunch and play schedule to ensure the children have as much space to play as possible.

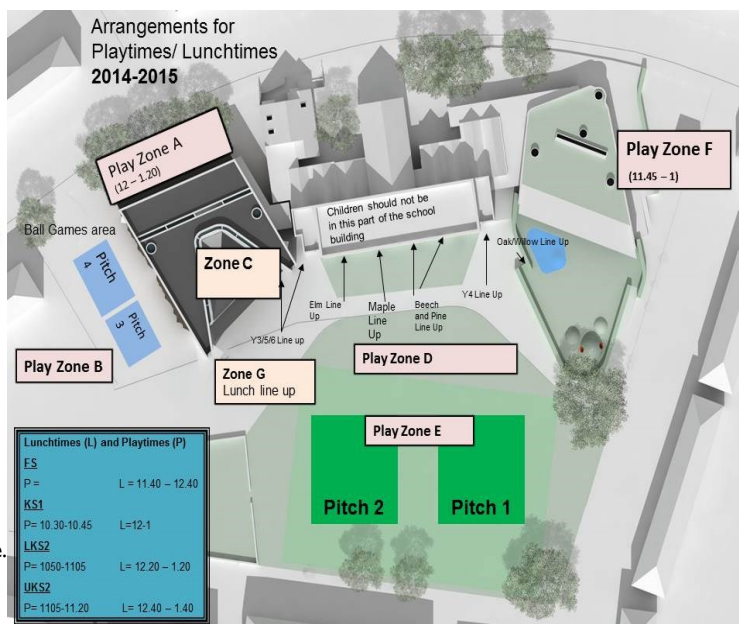


### Changes to playtimes and lunchtimes

We've made some changes to the way play and lunch times operate.

This is on our school improvement plan (which we'll be publishing on the website soon) The idea is that we ensure children have as

much space as possible to play and are able to get the best use out of the school's playground resources. Some of the changes include a more staggered start and end to play and lunch, every class now getting a football pitch every day, the promotion of small sided games, 4 pitches rather than 2, new rotas, clearer zoning of the playground and in addition we have more things planned for later in the year too. To help support these and future changes Miss Jones has now taken on the leadership of the school lunch staff team.



### Primary Schools in Richmond really are TOP!

Once more the 42 state primary schools in Richmond (64 in Richmond and Kingston) have performed incredibly well academically. Richmond is the number one achieving borough nationally practically across the board for all subjects (based on Key Stage 2 results) We really are fortunate to be in an area, and working in partnership with, local schools that are such excellent schools. We are very proud to be part of such a great borough. Indeed our academic results show that we more than hold our own against any other primary school not just in the borough but also in the country. As pretty much the most diverse school in the borough we're delighted our pupils show such great strengths in the progress they make with their learning. Richmond has consistently performed way above the national average and that trend is continuing. During October the school will be sent information which shows in more detail our academic performance and I will share that with you in due course. Of course academic results based on tests do not give the full picture of the education provided by any school. At Lowther we pride ourselves on providing a broad education where learning is engaging and exciting and that we work closely with families to help develop really well rounded, socialable and confident young people. Here's to many more years of great success.

Within the top achieving borough nationally we've managed some headlines ourselves. Some of which are outlined below.

Phase/Subject	Highlight
Maths KSI	At Level 3 the school achieved 20% more children gaining this level than the national average and 5% more than the Richmond average. Overall for Level 3 Maths the school was 15th out of 64 schools in Richmond and Kingston (9th in Richmond)
Writing KSI	At Level 2+ we were 7% above the national average and also above the Richmond average At Level 3 20% more pupils at Lowther achieved this than the national average (and 12% above the Richmond average) We were 7th out of 64 schools (and 6th in Richmond)
Reading KS2	We were joint first in the 2 boroughs for the number of pupils (100%) making expected progress in Reading. The school came 5th in Richmond and Kingston (4th in Richmond) for the number of pupils exceeding expected progress in Reading.
Maths KS2	We exceeded the borough average by 10% of the number of pupils making expected progress in Maths We had 100% making expected progress in Maths compared to 92% in the borough (ranking us at joint first) We were 14th out of 64 schools (10th in Richmond) with 55% of children exceeded expected progress in Maths compared to an average of 34% in the borough
Phonics KSI	Consistent year on year improvement, including very strong results in the way we support children to catch up in Phonics.
