## Dear Parents, Carers and Friends,

A great time was had by both children and teachers alike on our two trips last week! The air-raid shelter in Sheen was a wonderful primary source which gave the children a real insight into London life during the early 1940s. On Tuesday, we were honoured to have a guest speaker - a grandparent from the class - who spoke movingly about his war time experiences in Hungary under Nazi rule while we also learnt much about the Enigma machine at the Polish Centre in Hammersmith, and how cracking its code helped the allies win the war (we have included a QR code below for you to practise making your own codes!).

#### Home learning from this week's topics

Bar Modelling: This week, we would like you to answer the questions in your books, <u>drawing out a bar model as we have looked at in Maths</u>. We know you will be able to answer some of these questions in your head or by using other methods, however, bar models are an interesting way of visualising maths questions, helping to understand how to solve in a problem with missing information, and importantly, how to use the correct operation (+ - x ÷). We can then apply this method to trickier questions that would otherwise need to be solved algebraically. Please see an example below.
